The Design Museum launches Future Observatory Journal, where design, ecology and futures intersect

The Design Museum today launches Future Observatory Journal, a new online publication that seeks to reshape the discourse around design and sustainability.

Published biannually by the museum's research hub, Future Observatory, each issue explores a theme at the intersection of design, ecology and futures. The first issue's theme is 'bioregioning', a concept with the potential to redraw the boundaries of climate action. A 'bioregion' refers to an area that is demarcated by its natural rather than political borders.

The journal brings together established and emerging writers, researchers, theorists and practitioners from design and related disciplines such as anthropology, sociology and philosophy to explore this theme. Essays, interviews and reports explore bioregions from Kagoshima in Japan, to the Cauca Valley in Colombia.

Each journal's theme is explored in three sections: Forecast, Practice and Strategy. **Forecast** borrows the format of trend forecasting to offer a thematic overview of a key concept; **Practice** substantiates that view with case studies, interviews and think pieces; and **Strategy** provides an analysis of the systemic implications of the theme.

Contributors to the first issue include Arturo Escobar, Dan Hill, Sharon Prendeville, Shayari De Silva, Justinien Tribillion and BC Architects and Studies. Topics include the mapping of landscapes, the challenges of scaling up bioregional design and the extractive demands of green transition technologies. The journal also features a previously unpublished text by notable systems-designer Donella Meadows as well as a range of ongoing work from Future Observatory's research portfolio.

The journal is designed by award-winning graphic design and film practice, Studio Airport, based in Utrecht, the Netherlands, which has garnered acclaim for its design of Emergence Magazine, Sapiens Magazine and Normal Phenomena Of Life. Future Observatory Journal is published on a bespoke digital platform which priorities a fresh reader experience. Future Observatory Journal is led by editor Justin McGuirk, director of Future Observatory; deputy editor Cher Potter, curatorial director of Future Observatory; and commissioning editor George Kafka, Future Observatory curator. Future Observatory Journal's editorial board consists of Arturo Escobar, Dan Hill, Kristina Hill, Lydia Kallipoliti, Ramia Mazé, Timothy Morton, DK Osseo-Asare, Sarah Teasley and Thomas Weaver.

Justin McGuirk, Director of Future Observatory at the Design

Museum, said: "So much design that purports to address the green transition is trapped within systems and structures that have no desire to be changed, and will brook only a thin environmentalism. They will allow for improved recyclability, reduced plastic and the electrification of everything, as long as quarterly profits stand. The purpose of Future Observatory Journal, however, is to create space for rethinking the frameworks within which design operates. We want to widen the space for considering more fundamental shifts in the narrative."
